School Budgets

Along with many schools nationally, Rothbury First School has faced some significant budget challenges this year, due to reasons beyond our control. This has resulted in some extremely difficult decisions. We have tried very hard to make savings that will have the least impact on our children. This year we created an Early Years Unit, combining Nursery and Reception. Teachers and staff across the school have had their hours reduced. To maintain a sound budget for the academic year ahead we have now had to make the decision to have a composite Yr 2/3 and Yr 3/4. This course of action was not undertaken lightly. Governors are keenly aware of parental concern. We are confident that our excellent staff will do their best to continue to provide a fulfilling educational experience. It is something that we will be monitoring closely.

And so it is with great sadness and regret that we must bid Ms Gladston farewell. Her commitment and dedication to our children is hugely appreciated by us all. Ms Gladston has played a big part in transforming the outdoor learning experience for pupils, and her Forest School expertise will be sorely missed. She has set a high standard and example for the school to live up to. Recent research suggests that the most important teacher in a child's life is the one they have in Early Years. We have been so lucky and wish Ms Gladston the very best for the future.

Many parents have expressed their dismay at the reduced budget school has to work with and asked what they can do to help. It is always worth raising awareness by contacting our local councillor, Steven Bridgett and our MP, Anne-Marie Trevelyan, to whom Mrs Mathewson has already spoken when she visited school a year or so ago.

Also, Mrs Mathewson has arranged for the new Director of Education for Northumberland to meet with governors very early in September, again to further raise awareness of issues that the cuts are having, in particular to small rural schools. Any improvement to funding must come from a change in present Government policy, at a national level. If you are interested, both The Times Educational Supplement and The Guardian are good publications to keep abreast of the challenges facing all schools and offer free online access to articles. It is only by us all working together that we can hope to see any change.
