Pupil Premium Statement 2011-2014

In 2011-12 the Government established Pupil Premium Funding. This money was given to schools based on the number of pupils in the school who were eligible for a Free School Meal (FSM). We received £970.

In 2012-13 this funding was increased to include those children who were eligible for Free School Meals in the last six years and Looked After Children. We received a total £4984. This money has been allocated to support initiatives to ensure these pupils reach their full potential by improving their attainment and overcoming barriers to learning.

In 2011-12 the money was used in the following way:

- To provide training for teaching staff in delivering high quality interventions in literacy, to support raising the children's attainment in the core subjects
- Funding a theatre group visit to the school to enhance the curriculum, ensuring all children were given the opportunity to experience new learning.
- Funding for musical instrument tuition.

In 2012-13 the money was used in the following way:

- To support children in literacy and numeracy, to ensure that they achieved good progress towards their targets through small group work, with a classroom assistant.
- Enhancing the curriculum and providing a range of visits and visitors to the school, ensuring that all children were given opportunities to learn in stimulating and exciting ways.
- To provide training for teaching assistant staff in delivering high quality interventions in literacy, to support raising the children's attainment in the core subjects.
- To purchase resources to support literacy development.

The impact of this funding was that the children were enthusiastic and stimulated by the extra learning opportunities provided. The majority of children made appropriate progress. Their progress was monitored by teachers and the Headteacher and reported to Governors.

In 2013-14 the school received £11,500 Pupil Premium Funding, awarded for children receiving FSM, Looked After Children and Service children. The money this year was used to:

- Continue to support children in literacy and numeracy, to ensure that they achieve good progress towards their targets through small group work, with a classroom assistant.
- Purchase resources to deliver high quality interventions to raise children's achievement.
- Provide enhanced learning opportunities, by employing specialist teachers, to deliver aspects of the healthy schools programme.
- Provide training for staff in delivering high quality interventions in literacy and numeracy, to support raising the children's attainment in the core subjects.
- Continue to enhance the curriculum and provide a range of visits and visitors to the school, ensuring that all children are given opportunities to learn in stimulating and exciting ways.

In 2013-14 most children in receipt of Pupil Premium Funding made at least expected progress.
